Summer School Report, August 2021



How is the funding allocated?

Schools will receive a DfE Summer School budget based on the number of places offered for the Summer School taking place in 2021. The funding upper limit for St Edward's Academy is £71,640.00 for a total of 1200 summer school days offered. In September 2021, schools were required to complete a claim form to evidence the provision offered in August 2021. This enabled the school to:

- confirm that the summer school took place
- set out the total number of 'pupil days' offered
- confirm the total number of 'pupil days' attended

The daily rate for a pupil place is £59.70. Schools will receive the full per-pupil daily rate for any pupil for whom a place was delivered in line with this guidance. In all cases, schools will be able to use their funding to meet any reasonable accrued and unrecoverable costs. Academies will receive their funding directly in the October or November funding round.
